

This is called underscoring. There is a wide variety of music genres throughout musical theatre history. In today's world, we continue to see these traditional styles, as well as new ones. While singing is a huge aspect of musical theatre, we can't forget the amazing composers and lyricists who help bring the music to the stage!

Acting is a fundamental aspect of theatre. Whenever a performer is on stage, they are acting. That includes when they are singing and dancing. Acting is more than just "playing a character". Each actor on stage has an important duty to help tell the story through their characters.
