



Well, like it's been explained before, learning about the origins will help us understand the patterns we see today in musicals. For example, the greek chorus is seen in modern-day musical theatre. Think about a musical where you see a chorus of actors underscore a scene by singing. From the Romans, we have pantomime, which is a foundational aspect of dance. As we know, dance and movement is a huge aspect in musicals. Musical theatre is often described as a spectacle to see, as there are many shows with over the top set designs and costumes. This derives from the traditional masques from the 14th century. Improvisation from the times of commedia dell'arte is used across the board, not only on stage, but in rehearsals as well. Finally, going back to the Greeks, musicals are primarily performed on stages! The list goes on, of course, but keep in mind these origins as we continue our way through time and through musical theatre history.
