American Sign Language  
(ASL)

When talking about people with disabilities, using language that puts the person first before the disability. Ex: "Person with a disability" instead of "Disabled person".

Identity-First Language

A writing system that is often used by individuals who are visually impaired or have low vision. Braille involves raised dots that one can read by using their fingers.

Closed Captioning

A medically-based term that refers to a sensory, cognitive, or physical impairment, illness, disease, or condition.

Braille

A complete and visual language in which one uses hands, body language, and facial expressions to communicate.

Disability

Accepting others regardless of who they are or their background. It involves ensuring that each student has equal opportunities and the chance to participate in all academic fronts.

Person-First Language

When talking about people with disabilities, using language that puts identifiers first before the person. Ex: "Deaf individual" instead of "Individual who is deaf".

Inclusion

Displayed text on a television or screen that provides descriptions of auditory cues in addition to the dialogue.

Disorder

A term that refers to a physical, mental, or developmental condition and how it affects an individual's activities of daily living.
