

The glamorous make-up, exciting costumes, and breathtaking sets add not only "pizzazz" to the show, but help us an audience enter the world we are being introduced to. The design for a show is planned far before even the actors are assigned their parts! This is because designing and prepping can take long periods of time. A design may also reflect time period, the director's vision, or the story itself! So when you are applauding at the end of an exciting show, you are also applauding the hard work of the production team who brought the musical to life through design!





GOLDEN AGE SET DESIGNERS

Designed many prominent Broadway shows and films.


Some notable productions include On The Town, West Side

Story, and Hello Dolly! He was nominated 25 times for a

Tony Award and won 10.

Described as being "the most successful set designer of the Golden era of Broadway". He designed both stage plays and musicals. Some of the musicals included Guys and Dolls, South Pacific, and The King and I. Jo was nominated for 12 Tony Awards and won 7.

Began his career as a costume designer and eventually also did scenic design. He worked on several shows and would do costume and/or scenery for those productions. He won the Tony Award for Wonderful Town, doing the scenic design.




